New Faces, New Hours at Squires Library

Squires Library is beginning the new academic year with new faces and increased opportunities to serve students and other patrons. Two new faculty members have been hired, as well as new reference personnel. Other library faculty and staff have assumed new roles as well.

New Hours

During the "Ask the President" chapel held at Lee last year, students expressed an interest in increasing the library's Sunday hours. At the time the library was open 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. each Sunday afternoon. While library personnel had discussed a possible extension in open hours, the student requests expedited the decision. Beginning this academic year, the library's Sunday hours have been extended to serve patrons from 2 p.m. to 8 p.m. Students are taking advantage of the change and using the library for research and study during the additional hours. "I like the library being open until 8 p.m. on Sunday evenings," explained David Cowart, a Junior pastoral ministries major at Lee University. "I used to come in and try to do research on Sundays, but the three hours just wasn't enough time to get it done. The new hours are a life saver."

New Faces

Welcomed to the Lee faculty this academic year are Amy Mercer and Diette Ward, both of whom have served as library staff for several years. In addition, Leonora Laney has been hired as a Reference Librarian, and Amelia Avery has accepted additional duties to coordinate Interlibrary Services.

Leonora Laney was hired in August as a Reference Librarian at Squires Library. She serves as the library supervisor on Sunday afternoons and assists students and other patrons as part of the Reference team at the Reference Desk during the week. Mrs. Laney also works in cataloging materials and works on special projects. She is a recent graduate of the University of Tennessee at Knoxville with a Master of Information Science degree. Before coming to Squires, she worked at the Cleveland Public Library. She is the wife of Dr. Michael Laney, chair of the Department of Communication and the Arts, and they have 3 children: ReAnna, Mikaela, and James-Michael.

Amy Mercer joins the Lee faculty as a Lecturer and the Technical Services / Serials Librarian. She oversees technical services / cataloguing department. Mrs. Mercer previously served Squires Library as a cataloguer since 2003. She earned both a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and a Master of Library Science degree from the University of Kentucky. Before moving to Cleveland, Mrs. Mercer taught at an elementary school and served as Senior Librarian at the Green River Correctional Complex in Kentucky. A native of Owensboro, Kentucky, Mrs. Mercer and her husband, Lee, have two sons, Luke and Joseph.

Diette Ward is also a new Lee faculty member, and she serves as a Lecturer and the Electronic Resources / Instruction Librarian. Since 2007 Mrs. Ward has worked at Squires Library, previously serving as Coordinator for Interlibrary Services. Her new duties include coordinating library instruction and overseeing electronic resources. A 2006 graduate of Lee, Mrs. Ward earned a Bachelor of Music Education degree. She then continued her studies at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, earning a Master of Library and Information Science degree in 2009. She is a native of Seattle, Washington. Mrs. Ward previously served as an administrative assistant at the science library of the University of California, Riverside before moving to Cleveland in 2002 when her husband, Dr. Jason Ward, was hired as a Lee faculty member in the History department. The Wards have two daughters, Genevieve and Charlotte.

Amelia Avery has increased her work hours to full-time, and she now serves as Coordinator for Interlibrary Services—processing all interlibrary loan requests. She also assists library patrons in Reference. Originally from Edmond, Oklahoma, Amelia is a 2010 graduate of Lee with a double-major in History and Political Science and a minor in Humanities. Currently she is enrolled full-time as a student in the Master of Library and Information Science program at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

In addition, **Dr. Louis Morgan** has been promoted to Assistant Director of Squires Library. He will assist Library Director Barbara McCullough with administrative duties, as well as focus on library outreach and public relations. And, he will continue to supervise the library's Public Services department, including Reference, Circulation, Library Instruction, Interlibrary Services, and Library Preservation.





Heritage Highlights...

"Into All the World" Heritage Exhibit Opens



"Into All the World" utilizes photographs, artifacts and video to tell how men and women have taken the Gospel to 180 countries and territories during the past century. According to Historian David Roebuck, "The Church of God dates its world missions ministry to 1910 when Robert M. Evans led a team to the British controlled Bahamas. There they joined Edmond and Rebecca Barr in preaching the Pentecostal message to the Bahamian people."

The exhibit is located on the upper level of the library near the Dixon Research Center. Visitors may tour the exhibit anytime the library is open. The Dixon Research Center produced the exhibit on behalf of the Church of God Historical Commission and with the support of the denomination's International Executive Committee and Department of World Missions. The exhibit will remain in the library with occasional changes until July 2012.
