New Things to 'Discover' at the Library

Several exciting changes occurred at Squires Library during the summer, including renovation projects (Yay for the new café!), an easier way to locate all library resources with only one search, and an upgraded and electronic, self-guided "scavenger hunt" for Freshman Gateway classes.

Help Us Name the Library's New Café

The new café is located behind the Circulation area near the front entrance (and where bound periodicals were kept previously). This food service was housed at the Humanities Building before being relocated to the library this fall. Operated by Sodexo, it offers coffee, salads, sandwiches, cereal, yogurt, fresh fruit, pastries, candy and other drinks and snacks. (See the box to the right for current hours the café is open).

To encourage students to feel the café is their own place to hang out and eat, library personnel are collaborating with John Simmons and Mary Mathias Dickerson of the Art Department to display student artwork there. In addition, there is a contest for students, faculty and staff to help name this new food service location. The winner will receive a \$25 gift card to the library café. You may submit your recommendation via email to library@leeuniversity.edu. Please include the following information in your email: Your name, contact phone number, and the name you suggest for the café. Deadline for submissions is October 1st.

Library Director Barbara McCullough noted, "We hope students, faculty and staff will support the new café, and we are grateful to the Lee University administration and Sodexo for making the library one of the new food service locations on campus." Freshmen, Bring Your Smartphones to the Library!

The new library orientation for Gateway students is based on the QR code technology. Students will use their smart phones and work in small groups to read the QR codes, which will allow students to discover different areas of the library and the purposes those areas serve.

“In the library’s Public Services department we have been thinking of new possibilities for the freshman library orientation—wanting to make it interesting and informative for the students,” commented Dr. Louis Morgan, assistant director of the library. “When Diette Ward [instruction librarian] and Lori Mattace [distance education coordinator] attended the American Library Association conference in New Orleans this summer this is one of the great ideas they brought back to us.”

According to Diette Ward, “Using QR code technology as an orientation tool allows the students to have some self-guided discovery of the library and allows the library to use these new technologies in proactive ways.”

A New Way to Search for Library Resources

Squires Library soon will release a new addition to its homepage that allows researchers to find all relevant resources from the various library collections with a single search. Currently students must conduct multiple searches in separate databases and the online catalog even when they are looking for materials on the same topic. However, with the new *Discovery* service hosted by Ebsco, students will be able to enter their search terms one time and find results from the online catalog, all databases, the ebook collection, DVDs and other media, and from the various library collections located across campus (education, music, etc.). While students will still have the option to search only in a specific database or a specific collection (online catalog, ebook, etc.), this new service will make research easier by providing a variety of results from the entire library collection. It will also require students to utilize their critical thinking skills to determine the reliability of sources and select the one most appropriate for their research assignment. Look for this change to the library homepage coming soon.

In celebration of the 25th anniversary of Dr. Paul Conn's presidency at Lee University, this issue's interactive game provides biographical information of Lee's 16th president.

“What are we trying to teach these 1214 students who live and study here at Lee? We are trying to teach them that the greatest force in human history is produced by the fusion of man's ability with God's power. We want them to understand that the ultimate expression of the human experience is to train and prepare one's self with discipline and hard work, and then to submit one's self to the sovereignty of God to do as He wills with us. I want to teach them that the greatest power in the world is unleashed when the enormous energy of the human spirit is undergirded, channeled, and empowered by the hand of Almighty God.”

Dr. Charles Paul Conn was born in 1, Missouri, but spent most of his childhood and youth in 2, Tennessee. His parents were Charles W. and 3 Conn, and his father also served as president of Lee for 4 years. As a student, Dr. Conn demonstrated his leadership ability as the president of 5 fraternity, yearbook editor, and recipient of the 6 Award for students deemed by faculty most likely to make the greatest contribution to the Church. He married Darlia 7 and they have three children: Vanessa, Heather and Brian. Dr. Conn began teaching 8 at Lee in 1971 and received his Ph.D. from 9 University. He studied as a post-doctoral fellow at 10 University and has returned there four times throughout his Lee presidency to study and teach. He has authored numerous books about public figures in sports, business, politics and entertainment, including Country Music legend 11 and former Pittsburgh Steelers quarterback Terry 12. (Copies of these books are available in the library). In 1984 Dr. Conn was appointed Lee's first Vice-President for 13 Advancement. He was inaugurated as the 16th president of Lee University in 1986, and the university has seen 14 growth each year under his leadership. Focused on integrating the Lee campus with the local community and to provide diverse cultural experiences for the campus, President Conn was instrumental in creating numerous programs and events, including the Presidential 15, which brings to campus internationally-renowned artists each semester.

Remembering Former Library Directors...

Mrs. Frances Arrington and Dr. Don Smeeton

Professor Emeritus and former library director **Mrs. Frances Arrington** passed away on Tuesday, August 2, 2011, following an illness with cancer. An icon at Squires Library, she worked at the Lee library more than 50 years—first as a student assistant during her freshman year at Lee in 1949. In 1978 she became the library director and served in this position until her retirement in June 2002. During her tenure as director, the collection was reclassified from Dewey Decimal to Library of Congress, increased to 160,000 volumes, and became more diverse as well. She was known across campus for staying abreast of information technology and leading the way in securing electronic resources for students. She led the library's move to automation and development of an online catalog and initiated the use of research databases. The library was the first unit on campus to utilize computers. Mrs. Arrington was active in professional library associations and was awarded a Life Membership in the Association of Christian Librarians in 2003.



Following her retirement Mrs. Arrington continued to volunteer at the library in the Dixon Pentecostal Research Center, where she was processing the Lee University Archives. Although many current students may not have known her personally, many of the technological research tools they use daily were initiated during her leadership. A display of photographs and other memorabilia reflecting her life and years of service to Lee University will be exhibited in the library through mid-September.

Dr. Donald Smeeton served as the library director at Squires from 2002 to 2007 prior to becoming the library director at Eastern Mennonite University in Virginia, where he retired in December 2010. He and his wife, Debbie, then moved to Missouri to live near relatives. He passed away on Wednesday, August 3, 2011, after having been diagnosed with cancer. Dr. Smeeton was a minister with the Assemblies of God and had previously served in missions work in Belgium and South Africa.
